What is an Emergency Assembly Point?

- Leave the area quickly but remain calm.
- Follow instructions from the safety team, and proceed to the assembly point if required.

Severe Weather

During extreme weather conditions:

- Listen for announcements regarding severe storms. You may need to evacuate to a safer area within the building.
- Do not leave the building until instructed, unless specifically directed to proceed towards the EAP.

Know Your Role

Everyone has a responsibility in an emergency:

- **Supervisors:** Ensure all employees know the EAP and the importance of evacuating promptly.
- **Employees:** Familiarize yourself with evacuation routes and keep your workspace clear to facilitate quick exits.
- **Safety Team:** Monitor and lead the evacuation process. Ensure that everyone accounted for at the assembly point.

Keep Emergency Procedures Visible

Make sure emergency procedures are easy to find:

- Post signs around the warehouse indicating where to go and what to do.
- Conduct regular drills to practice these procedures and identify areas of improvement.
- Provide accessible information in multiple languages if needed.

Practice Makes Perfect

Drills are vital for preparedness:
